KNIZLEY: Judge --7 THE COURT: Counsel on both sides, in this situation where clearly he's not stricken for 8 9 cause, but the reality is he's going to end up not 10 showing up at some point during this trial. Does 11 each side really want to keep him on the panel and 12 force this guy to perhaps miss classes and not show 13 up and then we have to put an alternate in his 14 spot? That's what's going to happen. All we're 15 doing is automatically shifting an alternate in the 16 spot. That seems pointless. 17 MS.
