Yes, sir. All right. That's what we'll do.

Mr. Dailey, you can go on out and take a

break now. Thank you, sir.

MS. RICH: Judge, we need to get a little bit

closer and we need to take up something before the

next one comes up. Judge, we really need to clear

the courtroom.

THE COURT: I will. I'm going to do that. All right. Let me do this. Those that are in here, the jurors, Ms. Berg and over here, these close, if you could just step -- I hate to -- a little back and forth. This is just routine in every case. It happens in every case, a little back and forth.

Let me get you guys to step out right outside the door but be right there because we've got to bring you right back in. Okay? And we'll bring you right back in.

(PROSPECTIVE JURORS NOT PRESENT)

THE COURT: Are there any jurors in the courtroom? Any jurors? All right. There are none for the record. There are none here. Ms. Rich?

MS. RICH: Judge, very loudly, Mr. Knizley accused the State and the judge of being racist.

There are other jurors in this courtroom that heard it. Specifically, there are two jurors, juror 25,

Teiranni Kidd and juror number 7, Martin Moore that are African-American and they heard it, and there was laughter coming from that side of the room.

And now we have an issue of those two jurors hearing -- not only Mr. Knizley accusing the State and the Court of being racist by striking an African-American versus a white person, we also have the fact that Mr. Knizley leaned back over and said to his client -- what were the words?

MS. WALSH: I didn't hear it.

MS. RICH: Okay. And what were the words?

MS. WALSH: I didn't hear it.

MS. RICH: Yes, you did. Mr. Knizley leaned over and said, we're going to have to strike him now -- oh, you didn't hear that part? Mr. Knizley leaned over and said we're going to have to strike him now basically because he doesn't want you to be mad at him. I'm paraphrasing. Okay. And all of that was heard within the confines of these other two jurors.

THE COURT: See, I thought we were going to just be covering the media issues up here.

MR. KNIZLEY: Yes. There's no one in here.

I, in no way, suggested, implied that the Court was racist. I did and will say that the prosecution

pointed out one student who was an African-American male and begin to inquire of that student, are you in school, you're in school in Mississippi, are you missing court, are you missing school, and will it now be difficult for you to serve on this jury.

While we had a white female student, clearly on the record saying it, and that white did not get the same treatment. Now, I'm not saying that's racist. I'm saying that's what happened. And if she wants to call it racist, that's up to her, but I haven't called it racist. I haven't called the judge racist. I resent her saying that.

And may I say further, Judge, whatever adverse effect it may be to me, not to someone else, if there's someone in the courtroom overheard and then chuckled about it, it'd be an adverse effect as to me, but that's what happened. And if she wants to call it racism, that's up to her, but that's the fact, and I didn't call the Judge anything.

MS. RICH: Judge, it was an adverse -THE COURT: Just one second.

(OFF-THE-RECORD DISCUSSION)

THE COURT: Go ahead. Here's the thing. I don't know how to fix this.

MS. RICH: Well, I think there's a simple fix 1 2 THE COURT: You know, the mistake was, you 3 4 know, whether the comments of Mr. Knizley were 5 directed at Ms. Rich or whoever or not. I accept 6 what you're saying at face value, who you were 7 directing your comments to but you got loud about 8 it, that's the problem. 9 If it was directed at me or not, my skin is 10 thick and I can blow it off. People know me and my 11 heart. I'm not worried about my reputation about 12 these things. But the problem is you got loud 13 about it, I heard it and had to call you down to get quiet. It was too loud. I turned the mic off 14 15 up here at the podium. My mic is unplugged. I brought the people up here. I brought my 16 court reporter up to the front away from the jury 17 18 so that we could be quiet and you got loud about 19 it. And now we've got jurors that clearly heard it 20 because it was yelled. It was yelled. 21 MS. RICH: To me, Your Honor, it can be 22 solved --23 THE COURT: What?

MS. RICH: -- by just asking those jurors.
